Barron Withdraws From Woodland Council Race

Former Woodland council member Danny Barron has withdrawn his candidacy for a council post in the November election.

According to information provided by Election Superintendent Cynthia Powell and City Attorney Gary Byrd, Barron withdrew his candidacy from the race on Sept. 25.

The Talbotton New Era had reported that incumbent Mayor James Carter did not have any opposition in the election, but due to six candidates qualifying for the five council seats an election would be needed.

With Barron withdrawing his candidacy, that leaves only five candidates

leaving the remaining candidates without opposition. The five candidates will assume office on Jan. 1, 2026 and their 5 p.m. terms will end on Dec. 31, 2029.

The five remaining candidates include: incumbent T.L. Carter, incumbent John Haralson, incumbent Allison Owens, incumbent Jeffery Mitchell and newcomer Cynthia Carter.

The city will hold an election on Nov. 4 due to a referendum that will ask residents whether fluoride shall be added to the city's water supply.

Advanced voting for the Woodland election will begin on Oct. 14 and end on Oct. 31. Advanced voting may be done by visiting Woodland City Hall located at 49 East Main Street during the following dates and times:



Concerned About Safety Practices of After-School

Dear Editor,

I am writing to express serious concerns regarding the safety practices of Talbot County's after-school program. Specifically, I am alarmed by the way the transportation system is being mismanaged, putting our children at risk.

Currently, school buses and drivers are funded for two hours to transport students home after participating in the program. However, rather than using these resources to make sure children are returned safely to their homes, the program has implemented a drop-off system that is both neglectful and dangerous.

Instead of delivering children directly to their homes, the program has designated various unsupervised and inappropriate locations as drop-off points. These include churches, fire stations, gas stations, and in some cases, vague "general areas." This system has the potential to expose children to harm, especially as many of these locations are neither staffed nor equipped to supervise them. Furthermore, these sites may now face unintended liability issues for being used in this manner without proper authorization or safety protocols.

For example, one designated drop-off site is St. Mark's Church. This church is no longer operational and is located along the busy Highway 315 East in Talbotton, GA. Children dropped off here must cross Highway 315, walk approximately half a mile along this

high-traffic road, and then continue another half mile down an isolated and deserted road plus an additional half mile to reach home. That's a total of 1.5 miles—a dangerous and unacceptable distance for a child to travel alone after school. I am including the list of after-school drop-

off points as provided by Ms. Daniels, along with photographic documentation to show the hazardous conditions at some of these • Figure 1: Drop site for St. Mark Church

This situation is not just inconvenient it is dangerous. We entrust our school system to educate and protect our children, not to abandon them miles from home with the expectation that parents will somehow retrieve them. The current policy is unacceptable and demands immediate attention and correction.

Our children deserve better. I urge school administrators, transportation coordinators, and county officials to reconsider and revise this drop-off strategy before tragedy strikes.

Have a Heart, and Have My Wallet, Too

I thought I had said all there was to say about my recent fun and frolic with a heart attack, but a conversation with a good friend last weekend reminded me of one very important aspect of the issue I had not addressed:

The cost of it all.

Now unless you have lived under a rock for the past few decades (or you're one of those who doesn't believe things you see and hear and read), you know that medical care is, to put it mildly, not cheap. A recent study showed that the number one reason people file for personal bankruptcy in the United States is outstanding medical bills, some so high that even if the patient paid every cent they made for the rest of their lives, they wouldn't make a dent in the overall amount

It would be easy - very easy - to go political right now and point a finger of blame at one party or another and say, "J'accuse!" (Don't get the reference? Look it up. I quit being a teacher in 2016.) But I am not going to do that. I've made it a policy over the years in this column to avoid politics by any means necessary wherever possible, and I see no need to break that policy just to talk about the cost of health care. I have friends on both sides of the political aisle and I intend to keep it that

So I will address the issue of health care costs by looking at my own latest encounter with doctors and hospitals, and in the process share what I think is another very good thing I have going for me.

For those who came in late, I ran a series of five weekly columns describing what happened after I had a rather serious heart attack on the morning of July 31. I did touch on costs briefly during the final column, where the price of the medications I have to take was, to say the least, breathtaking. And since I didn't have much breath to spare at that time, I walked away looking for generic answers.

That brings me to today. I was going over the bills from both WellStar West Georgia Medical Center, where I spent just over one day, and WellStar Kennestone Hospital in Marietta, where I was a guest in the cardiac intensive care unit for a little under a week. That sevenday "vacation" was, without a doubt, the most expensive thing I've ever done in life.

I thought buying a house or a car, or going on a cruise, was expensive. Rest assured they are, but compared to a week in the cardiac care unit of any hospital, those items

are peanuts.

The total cost for a week (or just over) in cardiac ICU at two hospitals was just under (drumroll please) ...

\$400,000.00 Yes, you read that right. Four hundred thousand smackers just to get my ticker right and let it keep ticking. That's with the understanding, by the way, that at some point in the not-too-distant future, Dr. Rajeev is going to have to go back in there and put stents in two more arteries which are between 60% and 70% blocked. He wants to watch them for a while first. So there will be some more costs involved.

Now before you read any further, please understand that I am in no way, shape or form asking anyone for money. The bill was four hundred grand; fortunately, I have insurance. Medicare stepped in and paid all but \$2,070.00 of it. The hospital agreed to me paying \$100 a month until it's all taken care

Medicare is the "very good thing I have going for me" I mentioned earlier. Back in April, when I fell at the Renaissance Festival and broke my left arm in two places (well, stay out of those places!), I found out just how good Medicare can be, since I don't owe the Hughston Clinic anything today.

I read a lot of horror stories about how Medicare doesn't pay claims, doesn't do things in a timely manner, and so on. To that I say, poppy-

In my (admittedly limited) experience, Medicare has been a godsend. I hit my annual out-of-pocket limit with the hospital stay, and the year isn't over yet, so any further things related to the heart or any other issues - are going to be paid at a 100% rate by the insurance.

True, Medicare does not pay the cost charged by the provider; but then, nobody really does. There's a tradeoff at some point that allows insurance companies such as Medicare to pay a percentage of the bill and the provider basically writes off the rest. So I got very lucky yet again.

Why is health care so expensive? Alas, I'll have to write a different column about that. Stay tuned.

Georgia Home of Prolific Serial Killer

The State of Georgia has seen a number of serial killers over the years and some will never be forgotten like Wavne Williams in Atlanta. the Stocking Strangler in Columbus and others who will never be forgotten. However, there was one serial killer who was actually from Georgia who is believed to have claimed the most victims of any other serial killer in the United States.

Reynolds, a quiet and quaint rural town just happens to be the home of what the FBI believes to be the man with the highest number of murders.

Samuel Little was born in Reynolds in 1940. According to court records and Georgia history books, Little's mother was a prostitute who abandoned him. Authorities even believe his mother may have given birth to Little when she was in jail.

Not long after Little was born, his family moved to Ohio. There, Little was mainly raised by his grandmoth-

Little told authorities he began to think about killing women when he was in kindergarten and as a teenager he collected crime magazines, especially magazines that depicted the strangula-

tion of women.

You check all this out on the Internet, it's all there.

Little moved around the United States when he got older and was jailed many times. The first time he had law troubles was as a teenager and that trend continued throughout his life as an adult. At the age of 35, Little had been arrested 26 times.

Little was charged with his first murder in 1982 in Mississippi of a 22 year-old woman but a grand jury decided not to indict him on the charge. However, Little was extradited to Florida and tried for the murder of another woman, but was also acquitted of the charge due to jurors not believing or not trusting witness testimonies.

He was then off to California where he was arrested for beating and strangling two women. After serving two and a half years for those crimes, he was released, moved to Los Angeles where he murdered 10 women.

His story goes on and on. Eventually, Little confessed to 93 murders. However, law enforcement only connected him to 60 murders. However, he was only ever charged with and convicted of eight

I'm not sure any person in his or her right mind could sleep at night knowing all those deaths were on their hands.

For years, the argument has continued of whether serial killers are a product of their environment of if they are simply born as killers. I'm not sure there is a way to make determination or if its a combination of the two and even possibly other reasons.

However, experts do believe there are contributing factors, according to some criminologists, such as child abuse. According to one study, the most common factor is child abuse it's in the background of almost all serial killers.

You may wonder how a person can get by with so many murders before being caught. That is a good question but not one that can be answered easily.

In most cases, the serial killer will make a mistake.

Also, it takes a great deal of work and profiling by law enforcement to put together a profile that might lead to the arrest of the killer, and law enforcement has to have enough evidence to make a case. So, there are many rea-

Profiling is on of the most common procedures used by law enforcement in most serial killer investigations. A trained profiler will analyze evidence, look at the crime scene to determine actions taken by the killer, use the victim's background to shed light into the killer's motivation and other things and much more. Does profiling work? According to what I've researched, profiles are useful in solving a case between 50 and 85% of the time.

All that data, studies and criminology is great, but I believe a serial killer just likes the thrill of the kill.

I once sat on the jury of a murder trial. The question was proposed to the defendant in the case, if he had the opportunity to kill again if he would. He didn't hesitate to answer and his reply to the officer who asked the guestion during his interrogation was, "Yes I would, it's was better than sex."

Enough said, I believe.

Why Was a Plea Deal Offered?

Not only do the wheels of justice seem to turn very slowly, sometimes they appear to go terribly side-

No profession, white collar or blue collar, is exempt from attracting sexual predators preying upon our most innocent victims - our children. There are even preachers who succumb to such temptation. Here is a case in point.

Robert Morris was a highly respected preacher and

evangelist. He founded the Gateway Church, a huge megachurch in Southlake, Texas. Married with children, Morris was also an author and radio program host. He was the epitome of a trustworthy person -- a person the average family could trust their children to be around - and they did.


Years later it surfaced that in 1982 Morris began sexually abusing a 12-year old girl – the daughter of people who trusted him and allowed him to stay with them while traveling and preaching. With Morris warning her about telling anyone, the sexual abuse of this child continued for over four years. During those years the victim, too scared to tell anyone, kept this horrible secret as the sexual abuse continued, and intensified, until she finally told her father.

We cannot imagine the mental and physical torment the victim suffered as a result of this. We also cannot imagine the guilt suffered by the parents who trusted Morris. and the anger they felt at the betrayal. We do know the victim had to seek professional help, and can only guess how hard it must have been for her to trust anyone else.

That is not the end of the

As an adult, the victim sought legal redress and restitution. Attorneys for Morris offered relatively small amounts of money but only if the victim would sign a nondisclosure agreement which would have served to protect Morris's reputation, which could provide him an opportunity to prey on other girls. The victim refused and the sexual abuse charges went public and to court.

Prior to the sexual abuse charges going public, Morris had left Gateway Church and assumed a position with a megachurch in Alabama, from which he quickly resigned as the allegations surfaced.

FAST forward and the case was prosecuted in Oklahoma with Attorney General Gentner Drummond being quoted as saying, "There can be no tolerance for those who sexually prey on children. This case is all the more despicable because the perpetrator was a pastor who exploited his position of trust and authority. The victim in this case has waited far too many years for this day."

Based on those words one would expect the full weight of the law to come crashing down on Morris – except that it didn't.

Instead, according to news reports last week, a plea deal was made in which Morris, now 64, was sentenced to 10 years in jail but will only spend a paltry six months in the county jail, be required to register as a sex

offender, pay court costs and restitution to the victim.

Is this justice?

The sexual predator spends a whopping six months in the county jail while the victim is scarred for life though apparently she was satisfied that Morris was convicted. We can only imagine the anguish she suffered when recounting the years of sexual abuse.

There is definitely something wrong with this picture.

WE might imagine that in years past sexual predators caught abusing children were dealt with quickly and harshly. Likely in such a manner there would be no chance of the perpetrator sexually abusing another child. But today we are more civilized, or are

Perhaps in becoming more civilized, we have pampered the sexual predator while failing to account for the lifelong damage to the vic-

When the courts fail to truly punish those who commit such vile acts, it emboldens others to follow suit.

That's my opinion.

Orionids Meteors Being Spotted

For early risers, the dark sky has been incredible.

About 6 am, the planet Jupiter is easily seen. Look along a heading of about 132 degrees, or southeast and about 64 degrees above the horizon.

Venus is also visible. Look along a heading of about 110 degrees, or just south of east and just above the horizon.

Finally, according to our backyard favorite astronomer, Ms. Lynn, Uranus is located along a heading of about 224 degrees, or southwest, and about 75 degrees above the horizon. Uranus is on the edge of being seen with the unaided eye but conditions have to be nearly perfect with no light pollution, a very dark night, and very good night vision. Ms Lynn's favorite planet is Uranus.

A host of stars are visible about 9:30 pm on a clear night and among them is Epsilon Persei.

To find Epsilon Persei, look along a heading of about 70 degrees or east-northeast, and about 38 degrees above the horizon and there is Epsilon Persei.

What we see and identify as Epsilon Persei is actually a binary star. This that from our point of view with two stars appearing as one. The dominant star, Epsilon Persei, is about 640 lightyears from Earth. There is some conjecture that Epsilon Persei is a triple-star system, but that debate is ongoing. Nothing is known about the companion star, or stars.

Epsilon Persei is a massive star estimated at 12 to 16 times the mass of our Sun

and about eight times the size. Researchers suggest it is near or possibly slightly beyond the end of core hydrogen fusion. It is producing about 28,000 times the light from our Sun, which has a

blue-white hue. Epsilon Persei is part of the Perseus constellation, which was identified by second century astronomy Ptolemy, and named Perseus for the Greek mythological

Due to its distance from Earth, not much more is known at Epsilon Persei.

SOUTHERN THE Taurids Meteor Shower has started but the meteors are rarely seen from the Northern Hemisphere.

The Orionids Meteor Shower will be starting Thursday, Oct. 2, with peak

activity during the overnight hours of Oct. 20-21. At peak activity the Orionids shower typically produces 10 to 20 meteor an hour though some years it is considerably more. The best time to view he Orionids will be just before dawn and the waning crescent moon should not interfere with viewing.

KEEP YOUR eyes on the sky for passing fireballs.

Meteors can flash across the sky anytime and extraordinarily bright meteors are often referred to as fireballs -- and they are spotted quite

On Saturday, Sept. 27, five people in Georgia an Tennessee reported seeing a


The fireball was first reported at 8 pm by a skywatcher in Marietta, GA. The fireball was seen as far north and west as Taft, TN; as far east as Sandy Springs, GA; and as far south as Camilla, GA. The fireball appeared to be moving from northwest to southeast.

1953 - Actor Greg Evigan is Born

Here is what happened this week in American History.

• Oct. 9. On this day in 1635, America is but a colony when Roger Williams is banished from the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Williams was a vocal advocate for the separation of church and state, religious liberty and fair treatment of Native Americans. The Massachusetts Bay Colony was strictly Puritan. Williams had been a Puritan minister but would later become Baptist and still later did not identify with any specific church. When banishing Williams, the Puritans accused him of sedition and heresy, but he would go on to found Providence Plantations which became Rhode Island.

• Oct. 10. In 1973, Vice President Spiro Agnew resigns from office after being charged with federal income tax evasion. Former Governor of Maryland, Agnew had been elected to the Vice President position in 1969. After resigning from office, Agnew kept a low profile and died from undiagnosed leukemia in 1996 at the age of 77.

• Oct. 11. Today in 1985, Michelle Trachtenberg is born in New York City. When only three years old she stars in a television commercial which launches an acting career. She would be featured in a number of roles, most notably on the television series Buffy the Vampire Slayer. She died in 2025 at the age of 39, after undergoing a liver transplant.

• Oct. 12. In 1918, sparks from a train amid very dry conditions ignites a fire in Carlton County, Minnesota. The fire will burn

about 250,000 acres, devastating much of western Carlton County most notably Moose Lake, Cloquet, and Kettle River. The fire will be responsible for the deaths of 453 people with about 52,000 more suffering various injuries.

• Oct. 13. Today in 1892, astronomer Edward Emerson Barnard becomes the first person to discover a comet by photographic means. That comet was subsequently "lost" until 2008 when it was spotted again. The comet bears the name Comet Barnard 3.

• Oct. 14. On this day in 1953, actor Greg Evigan is born in South Amboy, New Jersey. At an early age, Evigan began playing the piano, organ and saxophone and performed in various small rock bands. His first acting roles were in productions of Jesus Christ Superstar in 1971. Evigan still enjoys a successful career and is remembered by many as B.J. McKay in the television series B.J. and the Bear.

• Oct. 15. In 1950, the Korean War Battle for Pyongyang begins. Republic of Korea (ROK) forces along with UN and US forces have not only driven the disorganized remnants of the North Korean military back north of the 38th Parallel, they are rapidly approaching Pyongyang, the capital of North Korea. The US had apparently received warnings that China would enter the war if US forces crossed the 38th Parallel. UN Commander Gen. Douglas McArthur had demanded the unconditional surrender of North Korea, but no such surrender was forthcoming. As a result, four ROK Divisions along with US and British units of the I Corps are racing to be

The Did You Know Column is Nine Years Old This Week!

In October of 2016, I had a problem - I was laying out a newspaper and had a "hole" in a page with nothing to fill it. Frantically thinking (the only way I know how), I finally remembered that I had a collection of odd facts which I'd used during my career as a teacher to entertain students, and figured, "What the heck. I'll try putting some of that here."

The result got a lot of notice, and it led directly (the next week, in fact) to the birth of "Did You Know...?" And this week, we celebrate nine years of bringing this silliness to you!

I can not thank you all enough for being with me these past nine years. You are the reason I do this. It means the entire world to me that you read this stuff each week, that you seem to like it, and that you want more.

Nine years. Shall we shoot for ten?

Did you know ...

... about half of the world's pigs live on farms in China? (But can they oink in Chinese? Hmmm?)

... the word "quiz" is wrongly thought to have not existed before 1800? Its origins are somewhat murky, but the best story about the creation of the word comes from Dublin, Ireland. In 1791, the manager of the Theatre Royal, Richard Daly (1758-1813), bet his friends that within 48 hours he could make a nonsense

city. Seeing some easy money, his friends took Daly up on the bet, and that evening Daly sent his employees out to write the word "quiz" in chalk on doors, windows, and walls throughout the city. The appearance of the word caused people to be talking about it all through Dublin, thus winning the bet for Daly. Serious linguists doubt the story for a lot of reasons, not the least of which that the tale was first written down 44 years after it supposedly happened. Also, if you look hard enough, you will find examples of the word "quiz" in print prior to 1791. So, while Daly's employees may indeed have written "quiz" all over the city, the stunt had nothing to do with the word's origin. (I hope you took notes. There will be a quiz later.)

... a house in Poland is incredibly narrow? The Keret House, in Warsaw, is exactly four feet wide at its widest point. Despite this, the Keret House contains a bedroom, a bathroom, and a kitchen in its three-story confines. What it lacks in width, it apparently makes up for in height. (And

... a Swedish warship sank
less than a mile into its maiden voyage because of faulty
measurements? The Vasa was
built and launched in 1628.
Less than a mile from its dock
– in full view of the King of
Sweden and his court – the
Vasa rolled over and sank.
Archaeologists studying the
raised hulk of the ship discovered four rulers that had been

Two of the rulers were based on the Swedish foot, which is 12 inches long; the other two were scaled to the Dutch or Amsterdam foot, which is 11 inches long. ... a fad called "red out" took place among high school students in 1948? It had to be one of the silliest ever. Regaining consciousness, many reported they believed they had been chased by monsters while unconscious. (The value of a high school education, folks.)

... a lawyer gambled on inheriting an elderly woman's house - and lost? In 1965, French lawver Andre-François Raffray (1900-1977) agreed to pay the elderly woman a "rent" of \$500 a month on her home in Arles, France, on the condition that he would inherit the house when she died. When Raffray died in 1977, however, the woman was still alive - and she would be for a while. The woman was Jeanne Calment (1875-1997), who was 122 years old at the time of her death and documented as the oldest person who ever lived. Raffray's family kept up the payments and eventually did get the



house, but in the end they paid more than twice what it was worth for it. (Subtle. Very subtle.)

...the life's work of a mathematician turned out to be meaningless? It happens to a lot of us, I know, but in the case of English mathematician William Shanks (1812-1882), it's extra egregious. In the days of yore, before calculators and computers were invented, Shanks computed the value of π to 707 places. But a review of his work in 1944 showed that Shanks had made an error at the 528th place, and the rest of the calculation was wrong. (Thanks to Mason for the tip!)
